


HOW DOES RCV WORK?



ADVANTAGES OF RCV

MAJORITY WINNER IN ONE ELECTION²


- Candidates win with Majority
 Support
- A Mandate Makes it Easier to Govern
- No More Spoiler Effect or Wasted Votes
- More Voters Elect Winning
 Candidate
 - No primary or special runoff election is needed.

- RCV is Associated with
 Rise in Women & People
 Of Color Elected^{5,6}
- Historic Gains in NYC City
 Council Election⁷



- To Win, Candidates Require
 Enthusiastic & Broad Support
- Unwise to Attack, Sling Mud
- More Civil Campaigning ^{3,4}
- RCV Elections More
 Issue-Oriented

Why RCV is Good for Richmond

- Always elects majority-supported candidates
- Gives voters more choice and voice
- Instant-runoff elections increase voter participation
- Delivers more representative & equitable outcomes, with more women & candidates of color elected
- Facilitates coalition-building and discourages negative campaigning
